It was the historic of day of June 20, 1960 that saw the doors of Bombay's newest College of Commerce & Economics open wide at dawn. The city, back then, wasn't so populated, and the Principal wondered if he would have enough students to fill his classes. History shows that classes filled up soon enough!

Located on 123 Dinshaw Wachha Road, at the intersection of the road that faces the University of Mumbai, with its imposing clock tower, the College was founded on idealism.

While the seed of what is today known as the Hassaram Rijhumal College of Commerce & Economics was planted in Hyderabad Sind (formerly undivided India), in 1945, and it was, perhaps, the first commerce college there, although another commerce college was also started the same year in Karachi, the fledgling Institution had to be hastily forsaken in the storm of Partition.

Uprooted and felled as their spirit was, the foresighted and feisty founding fathers of the College were not about to give up easily, and certainly not in their mission to create an educational institution of lasting value once they migrated to Mumbai (then Bombay) and attempted to restart their lives again. The trials were tremendous, but so was the tenacity of the many mighty men who were determined to germinate this institutional oak again.

One such visionary was Principal Kundnani who, along with Barrister Hotchand Advani, reconstituted the Hyderabad Sind National Collegiate (HSNC) Board in Mumbai, and set about restarting the two colleges the Board already ran in Sind, pre-Partition.

One was the D.G. National College, which was the very first college founded by the HSNC Board in Sind in 1921, and of which Principal Kundnani was Principal at the time of Partition. The second was the College of Commerce & Economics, started with the financial support of the merchant Bhaiband community of Hyderabad.

An interesting, and not entirely coincidental, fact is that when it first started in 1945, H.C. Malkani was appointed as its Principal - and when the College restarted in Mumbai in 1960, the mantle yet again fell upon the industrious H.C. Malkani, to take on the 'principal' role in mentoring and remaking the destiny of an institution that was so closely linked to his own! It was almost as though the two, the College and Principal H.C. Malkani, were a match made with divine exactitude that not even the ruinous Partition could rent asunder.

In the intervening years, between his two stints as Principal of the College, a lot had transpired. Most significantly, the map of the Sub Continent was irrevocably altered, and with it the lives of thousands of dispossessed Sindhis - all of who had to run helter-skelter overnight.


The building of the College of Commerce & Economics in Sind, which was inaugurated on October 13, 1945, by Dr. Radhakrishnan, the then Vice-Chancellor of the Banaras Hindu University was, according to the annals of history, occupied by Muslim refugees on September 12, 1947, leaving the Principal and staff with no option but to flee for their safety.

At the time, the College was already functioning as a reputed full-grade BCom College, affiliated to the University of Bombay, as all reputed colleges of Sind were in those days. All that came to naught, as the two Colleges set up the HSNC Board had to be closed down in the aftermath of the Partition.

Until, that is, Principal Kundnani took it upon himself to revive them again in Mumbai. The first to get up and running was the Rishi Dayaram & Hassaram National College (of Arts and Science) in Bandra, built on a plot of land Principal Kundnani obtained by the sweat of his blood and toil and, legend has it, by pawning his wife Jyotu's jewellery.

The challenges in getting that College started were stupendous, but Principal Kundnani was not found lacking in either vision or stamina, and far from feeling complacent over its successful commencement, he dreamt of building the HSNC Board, of which he was Secretary, into an educational colossus that would spawn many renowned colleges. In this, his mission was given wings by the late Barrister Hotchand Gopaldas Advani, an extraordinary visionary who was the Founder President of the HSNC Board.

So, in 1954 came the Kishinchand Chellaram (K.C.) College, in the heart of South Mumbai. Then followed, first, a Law College and, later, a Commerce College (subsequently christened the Hassaram Rijhumal College of Commerce & Economics, when a benevolent endowment of Rs. One lakh was given by the sons of Seth Hassaram Rijhumal). Both the Law and the Commerce Colleges were housed in a five-storied building adjoining the K.C. College at Churchgate - and continue to be, right until today.

Who would have imagined that one of the earliest contributors to the Voyager (the College magazine of H.R.) would be a cartoonist who later became, arguably, one of the most important men in Mumbai: Balasaheb Thackeray.

In the Acknowledgments of the Voyager, 1964, Editor J.N. Kamat writes: I am deeply indebted to Shri Bal Thackeray, the well-known cartoonist and Editor of Maarmik, for executing the poster that provoked a Student Symposium - 'Are You Indisciplined?'

Balasaheb, himself, may have no memory of his doodlings, but in the H.R. annals, his work is recorded for posterity.

As beginnings go, the renaissance of H.R. College in Mumbai (subsequently referred to simply as H.R.) couldn't have been more auspicious. Certainly, the God's needed to be exalted, as without some divine intervention the College that had been lost in Sind could not have been so swiftly and so splendidly restarted in Mumbai, and that too in such a short time.

An Akhand Path Bhog was performed for three days prior to the formal opening of the College. This entailed an incessant and ardent recitation of holy texts from the *Granth Sahib*. Daily, *kirtans* were performed by such legendary stalwarts of the time as Ram Panjwani, Tillibai Jiandani and Bhai Bhagwandas Masand. However, it must be underscored that the ethos of the College was secular from the start.

In fact, all the colleges of the Hyderabad Sind National Collegiate (HSNC) Board, prided themselves on their emphasis on the world 'National', and took due diligence in ensuring that education was accessible to all, irrespective of class, community or caste.


H.R. was no exception. Recorded in the Souvenir of the College, dated 1962, is the assertion that at its commencement "the majority of students were Gujarati, but other communities - the Deccanis, the Parsis, the Mahomedans and Christians also were represented in large numbers. The staff, too, was cosmopolitan; for, at the time of the appointment, only the qualifications were considered, as it should be. The College knew no barriers of community or creed".

The excitement was palpable when, on June 20, 1960, the H.R. College of Commerce & Economics was inaugurated in Bombay, the fourth college of the HSNC Board since its reconstitution after 1947.

In the brand new hall of the College sat an impressive audience including then Chief Justice H.K. Chainani (also Vice-President of the HSNC Board), Principal T.M. Advani (ex Vice-Chancellor of the University of Bombay), Principal Kundnani, Principal Malkani and many prominent members of the community.

It was, from the very beginning, fully affiliated to the University of Bombay. And Principal Malkani was back in the saddle again, a powerful portent of the success that H.R. College would quickly see under his sagacious stewardship.

It is pertinent to point out that at the start of the twentieth century, there was not a single commerce college affiliated to the University of Bombay. The very first one, Sydenham College of Commerce and

Economics, commenced in 1913, and for several years thereafter it was the only one. Much later, two more commerce colleges were started. When H.R. appeared on the scene in 1960 it was, hence, among the very few commerce colleges in the city.

At the time when H.R. College was to be restarted, Principal Malkani (formerly Principal of the College in Sind), was the natural choice. But he wasn't in Mumbai, as in the tumultuous period post-Partition, before H.R. was restarted, he had taken up a job as a Reader in Economics at the M.S.

University of Baroda. He was invited, once again, to be the Principal of H.R., and he readily agreed to be at the head of a much-loved institution. The *Souvenir* of the College, dated 1962, states: Whenever he looked back, he wondered whether it was the birth of a New College (which he presided over), or the rebirth of the old one! Whatever it was, the College grew from strength to strength, under his administration.

On the opening day of the College, an editorial in the *Souvenir* further recalls: "The two divisions in the First Year Commerce, for which the College was

Hence, the younger generation - the real leaders of the nation - should have a proper sense of reality, and also a spirit of optimism and rational enterprise, and produce, in a harmonious form, a synthesis of the antiquity of our culture and the modernity of the scientific age.

affiliated, were full, and the rush for admission was so great that the University had to give permission, as a special case, to have one more division. No doubt, the number of students seeking admission in the College was abnormally large; and yet the rousing reception to the College was a hearty sign that the College at Churchgate was satisfying a genuine need of the student community. Immediately, therefore, the Board decided to make it a full-grade College, and applied for affiliation; and considering the huge number of those who could not be admitted, it also sought permission for

three divisions in the First Year Commerce class, and three divisions in the Inter Commerce Class. It is once more to be noted that not only were the divisions full, but that there was, as in the first year, a huge waiting list; and the University had, at the last minute, to give permission for a fourth division, with a total of 500 students, in all, in the First Year. The results of the students sent up for the first University Examination were satisfactory. The College established a reputation for itself in the very first year of its existence."

Principal
H. C. Malkani
(1960 - 1971)



An economist, a visionary, an academician and a teacher who continued to be both Professor and Head of the Department of Economics during his tenure as Principal of H.R. College, H.C. Malkani was a student of the D.G. National College at Hyderabad (Sind), and was a Fellow of the College. Later, he joined the School of Economics at Bombay. He secured a high Second Class at his MA, with History and Economics, standing Second in the University. He was a Professor of Economics, first at Ramjas College, Delhi, then at Shikarpur (Sind). He became the first Principal of the HSNC Board's College of Commerce & Economics, when it was started in 1945 in Sind.

Immediately after migration to India, post-Partition, he became a Professor of Economics at Baroda College, and then a Reader in Economics at the Maharaja Sayajirao University of Baroda, and acted as Head of the Department of Economics from 1954-59. He was particularly gifted in guiding research students for their PhD, and was one of the recognised teachers for PhD at the University of Bombay.

He conducted and published 'A Socio-Economic Survey of Baroda City' (1954-55), sponsored by the Research Programmes Committee of the Planning Commission. He was a distinguished speaker, addressed several seminars and wrote many books throughout his illustrious academic career.

In 1960, he became the founder Principal of the College of Commerce & Economics (subsequently rechristened the H.R. College of Commerce & Economics) and nurtured it with passion, vision

and tireless hard work. The students loved him, the staff looked up to him, and in academic circles his reputation was impeccable. Very quickly, the College picked up in reputation and despite being a new institution, the classrooms were full and the number of students seeking admission was astounding.

An Editorial in the College Souvenir of 1963 notes: "At College socials, we see him at his best - witty, with a fund of anecdotes - and he makes everybody at home.

The problems of (running) a big College naturally worry him - a quiet academic man. But as he has the loyal support of his colleagues, and as he has identified himself with the College, he is giving it his best. The future of the College could not be in better hands."

Principal
P.N. Gidwani
(1971-1990)



Pribhudas Gidwani was born on August 12, 1916. As Principal of H.R. College, he rendered outstanding service for close to 20 years. However, his association with the Hyderabad (Sind) National Collegiate Board spanned 30 long years.

Principal Gidwani a man of considerable scholarship. He did his BA from Bombay University, following it up with a BSc. (Economics) from London, alongwith a M.Litt from Glasgrow and a Barrister of the Middle Temple London. He also studied at the faculty de-Droit at Paris.

He was a widely-traveled person and undertook many a journey through Europe, the Middle East and parts of South East Asia. This gave him a deep knowledge of people and places. He played a vital role in the growth and development of the H.R. College, and played a leading role in its emergence and shaping it as a holistic centre for learning. It was during his tenure that the College emerged as a prestigious institution over a span of two eventful decades. Under the able guidance of Principal Gidwani, the number of students increased, the activities of the College were enhanced and consistently good academic results were achieved. The teaching faculty and methodology were also strengthened.

Principal Gidwani, despite his considerable intelligence wasn't intimidating, and was in fact gifted with the virtues of generosity and compassion. He was an administrator par excellence and a benevolent father figure to all his

students. He had a patient ear and a helping hand for every one. Consequently, he was held in high esteem by one and all.

In 1977-78 the College introduced the Applied Component group of subjects, which included Advertising, Tourism, Computer System, among other subjects. He introduced innovations like the 'Discussion Group', which deliberated on various issues and aspects from semester to semester, to give momentum to the consumers' awareness movement. He introduced GASP (The Group Against Smoking Promotion) in 1985. He encouraged the publication of 'Undergraduate' - a journal by and of the students. After his retirement in 1990, he is living a fulfilled life with his family.

Principal Gyan Bhagchand Daryani (1990 - 1992)



Principal G.B. Daryani was born on June 5, 1938, in Hyderabad (Sind). He did his Masters Degree in Accounts and Commerce from the University of Rajasthan.

He started his career as a Lecturer at the G.S. College of Commerce, Wardha, in September, 1961. Later, he shifted as Lecturer to the Yogeshwari Mahavidyalaya Ambajogai in June, 1962.

He joined Smt. C.H.M. College, Ulhasnagar (an institution of HSNC Board) as HOD Commerce in 1971. He was appointed Principal of the MMK College, Bandra, from December, 1984 and continued there till June, 1990.

Principal Daryani was transferred to H.R. College

in June 1990 and he was the third principal in succession. He was an even-headed administrator with a cool temperament. H.R. attained new heights of academic excellence and became a better disciplined institution under his tenure. The Anti-Drug Week was successfully organized for the first time during the second year of his tenure as Principal of the College.

As a team, Principal Daryani and Vice Principal Indu Shahani worked wonders! 1990-91 was a landmark year in many respects: H.R. embarked upon College Development Programmes and brought about many infrastructural changes. Some of the highlights are as follows – a grand 10 ft. high entrance gate of H.R. College was built, a

brand new conference room was created on the fifth floor, a full fledged Seminar room was commissioned, the H.R. cafeteria was born, the Students Placement Cell was founded, the new avatar of the 'Voyager' (the College magazine) was launched, and various other changes affected. The College also introduced a new attendance scheme with motivation to students to attend classes.

Principal Daryani remained with H.R. College as Principal for two years and went bank to MMK College as Principal in June, 1992. He retired from MMK College, subsequently, and is enjoying his retired life.





Principal Mohan Hemandas Hjwani (1992 - 2000)



Late M.H. Ajwani was born on November 1, 1935 in Nowabshaw (Pakistan). He did his post-graduation in geography from M.S. University, Baroda, in 1960, and another M.A. in Economics from University of Mumbai in 1976. He completed his Ph.D. after his superannuation.

He joined M.M.K. College (run by the HSNC Board), as a Lecturer in 1961 and continued till June, 1964. Then he shifted to Chinai College of Commerce & Economics in June 1964 and remained there till June, 1981.

Further, he moved to Vivekanand College, Chembur, as a Senior Lecturer and Vice Principal in December, 1992.

He came to H.R. College of Commerce & Economics as Vice Principal and was here until June, 1990, when the HSNC Board appointed him

Principal of M.M.K. College, Bandra. He remained there till May, 1992.

He was appointed Principal of H.R. College of Commerce & Economics on June 1, 1992. Principal Ajwani returned to H.R. like a fresh breath of air, ushering in an atmosphere of camaraderie and trust among staff and students.

Being an even-tempered and unassuming person by nature, he endeared himself both to students and staff by virtue of his humanity, and his helpful, gentle and friendly disposition.

Principal Ajwani was instrumental in putting H.R. College among the top eight colleges of the Mumbai University and among the 209 top colleges all over India, selected by the UGC to teach vocationalisation at the degree level. This included subjects such as Advertising, Sales

Promotion and Sales Management, Tourism and Travel Management and Tax Procedure and Practice.

He took a lead role in introducing the prestigious Bachelor of Management Studies (BMS) degree course in 1999 at H.R. College. During his tenure, the Research recognition – Doctorate in Commerce (PhD) was accorded to the institution in 1996 for Business Policy and Strategy subjects.

He was re-employed by the HSNC Board as Principal of H.R. College in November, 1995, and continued his innings till October 31, 2000 when he finally retired from active service.

He went to the US to join his daughter and to avail of his green card holder permit. He even took up some teaching assignments there. However, on May 2, 2002, he passed away, leaving behind a rich legacy at H.R.



A doyenne in the field of academics, Dr. Indu Shahani, the current dynamic Principal of H.R. College, is credited with transforming the College into an internationally renowned centre for holistic student development. Dr. Shahani has over three decades of teaching experience at the college and university level, where she has played a lead role in nurturing future leaders. She is a firm believer in the student empowered teaching-learning model, which places the responsibility of learning on the learner and which also promotes creative faculty development.

Recognised as an international academician, Dr. Indu Shahani is Vice-President, International Baccalaureate Organisation - IBO, being the first Indian on the Board of Governors. At the University level, Dr. Shahani holds key positions at the Academic Council, Faculty of Commerce and

Board of Studies in Business Management. As Director, Academics, of the Hyderabad Sind National Collegiate (HSNC) Board, she is responsible for enhancing the academic standards of 29 educational institutions managed by the HSNC Board in Mumbai.

She was appointed Sheriff of Mumbai in 2008 and is now in her third term. She was awarded a DLitt by the University of Westminster, UK in November, 2009. She also holds a PhD in Commerce from the University of Mumbai, hers being the first thesis to be presented on a CD in 2000! She did her DHE, again from the University of Mumbai, where she stood First with distinction. In her MCom exams she stood Second in the University of Mumbai. A Fellow of the Sydenham College, she studied for a while at H.R. College during the time when her late father, H.C. Malkani, was Principal of the College.

She has been responsible for pioneering the Internationalisation of the Colleges of the HSNC Board, and has initiated linkages with several leading international universities, and has led Faculty Exchange Programmes and Student Exchange Programmes with Universities in the US, UK, Australia, France, New Zealand, Singapore, and so on.

Her Sheriff's Delegations and humanitarian initiatives have also won her much acclaim. Down-to-earth, compassionate, and accessible, she has motivated thousands of students as a mentor and role-model. At H.R. College, she has fostered Industry-Academia partnerships, to make education relevant in a contemporary economy and to give students the extra edge that coming to H.R. College, under her stewardship, invariably ensures.



When the College began, a major in Accountancy was taught in the final year BCom class.

In June 1967, the University bestowed its affiliation upon the College for teaching the optional subject of Business Management at the final year BCom. In 1977-78 the College introduced the applied component group of subjects which included Advertising, Tourism & Hotelry and Computer Systems among others.

In 1994, the College was among the first few to introduce the University Grants Commission (UGC)'s Scheme of Vocationalisation, which included the following three subjects: Advertising, Sales Promotion & Sales Management; Tourism & Travel Management; Tax Procedures & Practices. The College had the distinction of being among the first colleges selected by the UGC to teach vocational subjects. The UGC nomination came as a result of the strong industry-institute links developed by the College. The earliest recognition for research was accorded in 1996 for Business Policy and Strategy.

In 1999, H.R. College introduced the prestigious Bachelor of Management Studies (BMS), which is today the most sought-after course in the University of Mumbai.

Additional recognition came in 2002 along with approval for vocational subject of Principles & Practices of Insurance.

In 2002, the H.R. College of Commerce & Economics underwent an intensive process of Accreditation under the UGC's National Assessment & Accreditation Council (NAAC), a statutory body established by the University Grants Commission to rate institutes of higher education. The College was accredited for a period of five years with an 'A' grade (institutional score of 87.95%), and became the first college in Maharashtra to be accredited with an 'A' grade under the revised system of NAAC Accreditation.

Increasingly, the endeavour is to offer greater academic flexibility with the introduction of the credit system.





In 2003, the College came up with a twin-bonanza of specialised degrees, BCom in Accounting and Finance, and BCom in Banking and Insurance.

In 2008, H.R. was once again awarded 'A' Grade by NAAC, under the revised scheme, with the highest score in Maharashtra.

Additionally, add-on courses leading to certificate, diploma and advanced diplomas in various subjects and Honours certification are also available. For instance, the College has partnered with the Bombay Chartered Accountants Society (BCAS) to deliver a Certificate in Professional Accountany (CPA). Partnerships have also been forged with Corporates and NGOs to introduce certificate programmes on subjects as varied as Forex Management, Cyber

Law, Venture Capital, Vedic Mathematics, Ethics and Corporate Governance, Media and Entertainment, Due Diligence of NGOs, Gandhian Thought, Graphic Design Concepts, Know your Film, Banking and New Digital Media.

However, being affiliated to the University of Mumbai, H.R. offers the academic programmes recommended by the University with their built-in guidelines. In the proposed syllabus under autonomy, the College plans to introduce further innovations. In its quest for excellence, the College applied for autonomy in 2002 and was conferred autonomy by the UGC in May, 2007.

Presently, students have the option of picking degree programmes and courses, which ensure a value addition in their career choices.

On the occasion of the First Annual Day (January 20, 1961), Principal H.C. Malkani said in his address: "This College has made a good beginning. We have 477 students on roll. In all we have three divisions of the First Year Commerce class and one division of the Inter Commerce class. There are at present 20 members on the teaching staff. The studentteacher ratio is 24 students to a teacher, which may not be an ideal ratio but compares favourably with other colleges".



The BMS course is contemporary. Students are trained to deal with a dynamic, competitive field.

In a world of accelerating change, how do students understand the technological, environmental and ethical challenges they will face? In response to this query, the Bachelor of Management (BMS) Programme was born in June 1999 at H.R. College. Anil Harish, President of the Hyderabad Sind National Collegiate (HSNC) Board calls it "the best course in the best College"! However, every one of the academic courses offered by the College follows best practices and continues to set new standards.

The BMS, an undergraduate degree programme in Management Studies, is spread over a period of three years or six semesters. Like the rest of the academic courses at H.R., the BMS programme too has shown great promise through its student-centred approach, strong emphasis on teamwork and a culture that believes both faculty and students have much to learn from each other.

The BMS course encourages education and research that are distinctively interdisciplinary and international. It aims to develop leaders who also

have the ability to become team members, and individuals with a sense of passion, creativity and commitment. Students are encouraged to develop the quintessential skills of effective communication, motivation and group dynamics.

"At BMS, we aim at developing students as managers with a heart, and responsible global citizens through holistic education," asserts Principal Dr. Indu Shahani. To keep pace with emerging trends, BMS organises for its students various workshops to ensure they are equipped

with skill sets required by industry. There are Leadership Workshops, Personality & Confidence Building Workshops, Grooming & Corporate Etiquette Workshops, and the like. At BMS, interaction with industry takes place in various forms. This diversity of interaction exposes students to various facets of the corporate world.

Some of the very best talent from the corporate sector comes in for Guest Lectures. In addition, panel discussions, industrial visits, seminars, events, and festivals like Primetime (a media, advertising and entertainment extravaganza) and intercollegiate competitions enliven the BMS experience.

The youth embodies boundless energy and a continuous thirst for new horizons. Recognizing this, the BMS programme at H.R. encourages students to aspire towards excellence.

On the occasion of the Fifth Annual Day of H.R. College, Principal H.R. Malkani himself laid the early foundations of business management studies at the College when he said: "We should now reshape our courses and include Management Studies. Now that the University of Bombay has instituted the Master's Degree in Management Studies, it is necessary that we should make our courses 'management-oriented'. Actually, I have been feeling that in recent years, the value of our Commerce graduates has gone down in the market."

Invariably, the students are at the epicentre of all intellectual activity at H.R., and every effort is made to integrate learners at various levels into the system.

For instance, the College is perhaps among the few in Mumbai to have a detailed and dedicated programme for the integration of Slow Learners. The first measure is Remedial Coaching, as additional training is given to enhance proficiency. This is done by giving tests, extra notes, personal coaching, simplifying and/or shortening content, trying alternative instruction and testing methodologies. Use of volunteers or peer tutoring is another tool. Sometimes by simply placing the right students together in pairs or group situations, peer tutoring can be utilized without drawing attention to the slow learner. Slow learners require more hours of academic instruction to keep pace, which they are able to gain in the special classes with the help of peers. The Mumbai Dyslexia Association also conducts workshops in the College from time to time.

Principal G.B. Daryani, in his Annual Day address (1990), announced: "H.R.'s consistently good academic performance at the H.S.C. and the University Exams, not forgetting sports, has proved the point that H.R. College has always been much above average. At the 1990 University Examination (T.Y. BCom) there were 122 first classes, with our Raji M. Ajwani standing first in the University. This is no mean achievement! At the H.S.C. our results were an unmatched 99 per cent."

Records show that students involved in the Grade Improvement Programme respond positively to the College's efforts.

For students who are slipping in their studies, there is the Grade Improvement Programme. The main objective of this programme is, by its very definition, to improve the grades of students who have secured lower grades in their last examination. At the beginning of the academic year, fifty to sixty students are identified as needing help on the basis of their overall performance or their scores in individual subjects. Ways and means are discussed to improve their performance in the current year. These students are given extra coaching and tests in all subjects. Their performance is again reviewed and discussed. Hence, a system of continuous evaluation and assessment is followed throughout

the year. Internal analysis at H.R. shows that students involved in the **Grade Improvement Programme** respond positively to the College's efforts and have consistently improved their performance significantly. A Helpline of the teacher assigned is available for these students to call in times of difficulty. The College Counsellor holds special counselling sessions for these students and is available on call. Special Workshops are held by experts on anxiety and stress management especially during exams.

At the other end of the spectrum are the Advanced Learners. For them, H.R. has instituted its Honours Programme.

It was formally launched in the academic year 2007-2008, and aims to enrich the regular curriculum prescribed by the Mumbai University It provides an integrated, inter-disciplinary and multi-disciplinary experience throughout the three years of their degree course and enhances the students' creative and critical thinking skills. It works something like this: the College identifies the top students in every class and forms the Scholars'

Club. The students are challenged with additional assignments, class tests and special exams. KPMG, a leading multinational consultancy, has started the Summer Leadership Camp for scholars where students are taught skill sets that go beyond their College curriculum.

The ultimate destination of students participating in the Honours Programme would be graduation plus an Honours citation. It is also an end in itself giving the able student a richer course of study than the undergraduate programme.

Principal P.N. Gidwani notes in his Annual Report 1981: On the academic side, the College results were excellent. At the H.S.C. examination we scored 94.66 per cent, against the Board's 50.80 per cent. 456 students secured first class marks and 86 passed with distinction. Moreover, three students figured in the Merit List: Jasmin Fidahussain Berarwalla was second in order of merit, Jyoti Harish Jaipuria and Smeeta Arvind Mody were fourth.

The H.R. Advisory Council with its Board of eminent personalities, assists in promoting academia-industry interface.

With an eye firmly on offering the most meaningful and relevant educational experience possible for its students, their employers and the community, the College constituted the HR Advisory Council (HRAC) in 2004, inviting aboard eminent personalities in the fields of academics, business, media and industry.

The purpose of the Council is to guide H.R. in developing the strategic direction for fulfilling the mission and objectives of the College, help in developing and maintaining a positive image of the institution, and assist in promoting academia-industry interface. Some of the tools adopted include industry participation, guest lectures, seminars, workshops, faculty

development and student internships. The College is committed to academic excellence. Hence, the overall performance of students is monitored through both Result Analysis and Academic Audit. Result Analysis is done for each of First, Second and Third Year classes using parameters such as performance at mid-term

examination, performance at annual examination, performance in project work and performance in summer placements. Such an analysis identifies overall performance at a glance, including the number of students with distinction, first class, and students within the top twenty-five ranks. The

analysis also keeps track of students who have not performed well.

The College has been conducting extensive exercises in Curriculum Development with the full participation of its faculty since it applied for autonomy in December, 2002. A Curriculum Development Cell (CDC) was set up within the College with key faculty members.

The College has undertaken several initiatives which include interacting with current and past students to get their feedback on the existing and proposed curriculum; interacting with advanced and slow learners; interacting with subject experts; interacting with the corporate world; interacting with University departments; visiting other colleges in the country; studying international curriculum; inviting experts from India and abroad; encouraging college teachers to participate in the University Boards of Studies and Professional Bodies, all in the best to keep upgrading the academic standards at H.R.

Currently, the faculty are actively involved in the University's curriculum development exercises by participating in the Academic Council, Boards of Studies and other committees and have exerted a major influence on the process of Curriculum Development at the University level.

Forty-three years after its inception, came a big breakthrough when the H.R. College started a postgraduate programme and enrolled students for the MCom course in 2003. The inauguration was held on July 7 by Dr. V.N. Gupchup, Former Pro Vice-Chancellor of University of Mumbai. Dr. Gupchup exhorted students to be proactive and to learn the skills of knowledge management in a changing society.

H.R. opted for MCom with management subjects. Students were offered eight subjects over the two-year programme."

The MCom programme continues to be popular at the College. A majority of the lectures are taken by the internal faculty, which brings in the required academic rigour. Classroom teaching is supplemented by guest lectures, seminars, workshops and live projects.

Rekha Bahadur, Vice-Principal of H.R., recollects: "There are several distinguishing features in the programme. The first is mandatory 75 per cent attendance at lectures. We also have terminal and preliminary examinations, in addition to continuous monitoring of performance. Guest faculty from management institutes as well as industry are roped in."

Given the foresight of the H.R. College management and faculty, and the constant emphasis on introducing a global perspective to classroom learning, there has been, for the past several years, a tremendous emphasis on learning without boundaries. Just as students of the College are encouraged to go on overseas study tours and avail of international internships and scholarships, foreign students can apply to any programme in the College after seeking eligibility from the University of Mumbai.

The College helps international students with home stay, guest house and hostel facilities. Parents of local students are encouraged to invite these students home on festival days and holidays. International students are encouraged to do certificate programmes in Indian art, culture, drama and film, including programmes such as 'Gandhian Thought'. International students are also motivated to participate in all College activities, sports and inter-collegiate events.

The College even has an international office and a full fledged International Director who coordinates the activities for international

students. The college hosts visiting faculty and students from leading universities in the US, UK, Australia, New Zealand and Finland.

Programmes such as the HR Model United Nations, Economics Convention and Study India proffer platforms for the participation of international students. Twenty-four MBA students from Finland's Tampere University of Technology (TUT) and University of Tampere (UTA) visited the College for an 'India Orientation'.

More recently, delegations from the Bromley School and King's College, U.K., have visited the H.R. College on exchange programmes, offering interesting opportunities for cross-cultural youth learning.

In any educational institution of repute, the library is the hub of student life. If not through the year, then certainly come exam time! All the bonafide H.R. students, as well as the teaching and non-teaching staff members of the College, are allowed to utilise library facilities with no extra charge. A number of ex-students and outsiders also avail the membership with special permission.

During examination periods the timings are extended up to 8.00 p.m. and it is also kept open on Sundays and public holidays. A recent innovation was the introduction of a 24x7 library reading room facility, where students can study all night under the supervision of an attendant.


This has become very popular with the students and H.R. College is probably the first to introduce a 24x7 reading facility.

The open access library facility provides better availability of books to the students. Besides this, the College has introduced various innovations for access and usage within the library. For instance, regular theme-wise book exhibitions are held to reveal the available library collection on various topics. Systems like Library Hour, library-based assignments and projects improve awareness of the library. Accurate computerized catalogues, providing a range of keywords, simplify the information search procedure.

Besides this, various support facilities are

available in the library. These include computer labs in and around the library, which are equipped with internet and other software; Wi-Fi facilities, which enable students to use laptops in the library; a Reprographic Centre; and the Teaching Learning Material Center (TLMC), which exists for the purpose of improving teaching and learning by providing resources to teachers and students.

In addition, a television and video are available to view the video collection of the library. And the Language Lab enables students to improve their communication skills in Hindi, English, Advanced English and French. A Linguaphone facility is also available whereby students can record their speech and hear themselves enunciate.



TEACHERS: MOVERS & SHAPERS

Led by Principal Dr. Indu Shahani, H.R. College has evolved a new educational philosophy: To put the responsibility of learning on the learner. Hence, the instructional paradigm has, perhaps for the first time, shifted from a teacher-centric model to a learner-centric one.

Critical analytical faculties are evolved as students explore their own problem-solving skills in an environment that, while being supportive, isn't smothering or stifling. H.R has seen much success with its student-centric methodology, proving it is superior to the traditional teacher-centric approach.

Simply put, this is because the **student-centric model** leads to student empowerment. The role of the teacher shifts from being the 'Sage on the Stage' to being a 'Guide by the Side'. The students, on their part, assume active responsibility for their own learning. Interactive methods such as project work, class assignments, working in small groups or in pairs, role play, brainstorming and using case studies are all extensively used to get students involved in the process of their education.

The key highlights of the student-centric model at H.R., which has helped students acquire life skills, knowledge management and long-term learning are: Summer School; Corporate Seminars (which

cover a wide range of dynamic courses reflecting emerging trends); Certificate Courses (such as Finance Fundas, Environmental Economics Marketing in Action, Advertising in Action and Vedic Mathematics); organising the 'Distinguished Lecture Series', where professionals from leading organisations address educate students on the dynamics of the real world; creating partnerships with industry, NGOs and other stakeholders (to bring communities to the classrooms) and so on.

It is part of an ongoing quest to institute state-of-the-art infrastructure and modern teaching-learning methodology to make knowledge acquisition effective at H.R. Students are encouraged to undertake internships in order to acquire a hands-on learning experience. Training the faculty in developing student-centred teaching-learning techniques by hosting programmes on the 'Craft of Teaching' and 'Teaching Pedagogy' are steps in this direction.

At H.R. College, the following dictum is held dear when it comes to imparting education to students: "If I can't learn the way you teach - teach me the way I can learn."

Thus, the teachers follow extensive Strategic Planning Exercises to organize the teaching schedules. These involve reinforcing the vision and mission of the College, establishing objectives and outcomes of the teaching-learning process and making detailed teaching plans. Strategic planning exercises have been held for several years.

As part of such strategic planning, the College has adopted 'The Instructional Design Triangle' model, credited to the Eberly Center for Teaching Excellence, Carnegie Mellon University, US, which integrates Course Objectives, Instruction and Assessment. This model was learnt and adapted through a Faculty Development Programme in which eighteen faculty members participated at the Carnegie Mellon Training Programme held in November, 2005, and in subsequent Staff Academy sessions where all faculty members were introduced to the

model and where it was formally integrated into the system. Teachers at H.R. follow the model in the entire teaching-learning process of teaching plans, classroom techniques and evaluation systems.

The visit to Carnegie Mellon was followed by a week-long workshop in October, 2006, when Ann Rumpus, Head of the Educational Initiative Centre, University of Westminster, UK, was invited to orient teachers in planning their lessons along with other student-centred teaching-learning strategies.



Thus, at the start of every academic year, teachers prepare Teaching Plans, which are shared with students and aid in the organisation and structure of the daily lectures.

In order to gain uniformity in teaching and to train new entrants into the College, Departments create Instructors Manuals, which are used by the Department. These include subject study material, reference books, worksheets and exercises, application-oriented examples, extra reading and evaluation techniques. The Head of the Department compiles the manual in consultation with the other members.

T.Y.B.Com. teachers prepare Course Packs for the

University exams, in a bid to assist students well in advance and prepare them for the final examination, and First Day brochures are given to undergraduates when they commence their degree programme, to familiarise them with the teaching schedules, subject wise.

Innovation isn't easy, but it is well worth the effort!

Every effort is made to adapt the Lecture Method to include 'Improved Lecturing Practice', which entails Discussions, Demonstrations, Buzz Groups, Question and Answer sessions and Computer-Assisted Learning, all of which encourage active student participation. The CAL (Computer-Assisted Learning) Method has revolutionized teaching at H.R. as it has introduced 'The Demonstrative Method' of teaching.

Project-based learning has become another common method of teaching at H.R. Students are encouraged to undertake research on assigned projects, individually or in groups. Students grow in confidence as they address the class and hone their presentation skills. When working in groups they develop team spirit and pick up interpersonal skills.

Guest Speakers from industry help keep students abreast of contemporary developments and have proved especially useful in the areas of Banking, Insurance, Finance and Management, where a topic requires a dimension of industry to be shared with the students. With the strong industry linkages enjoyed by the College, quality Guest Speakers are roped in routinely, offering a huge value-add to the learning experience of students.

Various subjects are taught entirely through the Seminar Method, where a panel of experts shares their experiences from the corporate world with the students.

The Case Study Method is extremely useful in developing analytical and critical thinking skills and keeping students aware of the practical challenges in the real world. Many teachers of the

College have undergone training in using the Case Study Method.

In a bid to bring in a breath of fresh air, the **Role Play Method**, yet in its nascent stage at the College, requires introduction to a problem by students assuming different roles to facilitate learning. The teacher clearly defines the different roles and actively co-ordinates the students' actions. Students gain confidence and communication skills and learning is made enjoyable.

Technology has been well integrated into the curriculum and the teaching methodology at H.R. Video Films are shown for a variety of subjects,, followed by Group Discussions, where students are encouraged to debate issues. The College library possesses hundreds of DVDs, VCDs and

CDs on wide-ranging subjects to be used in class. Proactive efforts in this direction include creating state-of-the-art infrastructure and introducing techno-savvy conference rooms, seminar rooms, classrooms and computer laboratories. All staff and students have internet access as the college has been made wire free.

There is a famous Chinese proverb: "Tell me and I

forget. Show me and I remember. Involve me and I understand." This has become the mantra for practical teaching at H.R. College. Tutorial work or 'Practicals' involve problem solving, analysing and decision making, and ensure personalised attention from the teacher.

The College employs Brainstorming and Group Discussions as a means for nudging lateral

thinking skills. A normal lecture may well take the form of a Brainstorming Session and lead to a vibrant discussion.

Another innovation is Simulations and Games that help students learn through direct experience. A Simulation is essentially a group activity with a serious educational purpose. The teacher prepares material for the exercises, sets the scene

of the Simulation and prepares the participants for the Game, then receding to play a neutral role, drawing out the thoughts and feelings of the students instead.

Buzz Groups, often created amongst students during a lecture, are yet another reflection of the highly interactive classrooms at H.R. The teacher poses a question or makes a statement and asks students to discuss the subject among themselves in small groups of two or three. 'Buzz' levels are raised in the class, reflecting the intensity of student application.

Going Online

Online Learning is currently, one of the most effective off-campus methods of teaching as it permits students to learn from anywhere - and that too at their own pace. For some of the courses, teachers even post notes and conduct tests online.

The College has uploaded eight Certificate Programmes online, in subjects relating to

Experiential Learning

In a bid to make learning a first-hand experience, students are expected to undertake at least one field visit every semester to gain an understanding of real life and to follow the expedition up with a written

report on the learning that comes of such visits.

Such experiential learning includes a broad spectrum of learning experiences such as community service activities, sensitivity training and team work.

The College has an ongoing arrangement with leading organizations such as Crompton Greaves, Nitco Tiles, SET - Sony Entertainment Television India Ltd... Crystal Comb Mfg. Pvt. Ltd., and Thakur Infra Project Pvt. Ltd. for field visits.

The College also actively collaborates with NGOs, such as the Jaipur Foot Camp in Bulsar and United Way India, for regular visits. Students of the College, who specialise in Finance, are invited as studio audiences to the CNBC-Television 18 Studio to participate in current debates/discussions on financial matters and to discuss the Budget every year.

The Academic Council

One of the many innovative practices at H.R. is the formation of the Academic Council, which includes student co-coordinators, co-coordinators and a treasurer. The Council serves as an effective mechanism to monitor the courses and provide feedback to the faculty.

The College has been proactive in its approach toward developing student-centered teaching techniques. A considerable amount of time and effort has been spent by the College in developing 'Active Learning Strategies', with the help of new digital media.

Reaching Higher Milestones

The Research Cell, set up by the college, offers opportunities for minor and major research projects, which both students and teachers are encouraged to undertake, sometimes jointly. The Cell also urges faculty to attend seminars on research topics of their interest and publish papers.

The Cell has organised workshops on Research Methodology, and research experts such as Dr. V.N. Gupchup (Former Pro Vice-Chancellor, University of Mumbai) and Dr. Abhay Pethe (Professor of Economics and former Dean, Faculty of Arts, University of Mumbai) have been inducted on the H.R. College Advisory Council (HRAC) by virtue of their expertise on research. Faculty members are free to approach them for any advice on their research projects.

On an ongoing basis, faculty doing current research are encouraged to share their progress and elicit feedback as part of the Staff Academy. The Research Cell has taken a lead in felicitating teachers who have successfully completed their PhD's at H.R. College.

Students have also, facilitated by the teachers at H.R., gone on to do their PhD, and at the undergraduate level have partnered with associations like the Indian Merchant's Chamber (IMC) to jointly undertake research projects.


An analysis of students' evaluation of teachers has shown that 87 percent of teachers have been evaluated as high performers or potential high performers.

The institution firmly believes in what John Dewey said: "You haven't taught, unless someone has learnt." Hence, the College has introduced an effective system of teacher evaluation by students.

Teacher Appraisal, by the students, is an ongoing exercise at the College for the past several years. New recruits are evaluated thrice-a-year, while senior faculty members are evaluated twice-a-year by students. Evaluation outcomes are given in a sealed envelope to teachers by the Vice-Principal (Academics).

For many years, the College had undertaken Teacher Appraisals through conventional methods. More recently, the College has adopted the more advanced method of Scantron evaluation for teachers. Faculty members are, hence, able to discover the areas of improvement. An analysis of students' evaluation of teachers has shown that 87 percent of teachers have been evaluated either as high performers or as potential high performers.

H.R. has also introduced '360 degree Evaluation', where teachers are assessed by students, their seniors and their peers.

The foundation for the philosophy to reach out and make a difference dates right back to the inception of H.R. College. In the very first College Souvenir dated

1962, it is noted: The Students' Association was started under the able guidance of Principal Malkani and Prof. Motilal, with a view to inculcate in the students the spirit of service, sacrifice and discipline to channelise their energies for various nation-building constructive activities.

The Association was formally inaugurated at a grand meeting by Principal K. T. Merchant of Sydenham College, when he paid a generous compliment to the new college, and gave a learned and inspiring lecture on the activities of students, and what an Association like the one he was inaugurating should do.

The highlight of the activities of the Association was collecting an amount of Rs. 1884 for the Students' Aid Fund, and loaning out full sets of text-books for poor and deserving students out of the said Fund.

Monetary help was also granted to poor students to enable them to pay their tuition fees.

An Elocution Competition was held under the auspices of the Association on 23rd November 1960; the subject was 'Student Indiscipline'. Many students took part, and Kumari Freny Achariya, Shri Dadi Burjor and Shri Bapasola won the prizes. Shri Vivekananda Jayanti was organised on 31st January 1961, at 10-45 am. Swami Sambuddhanand of the Ramkrishna Mission Ashram was the Chief Guest. The Tagore Centenary was celebrated with appropriate grandeur on 8th February 1961, when Prof. S. N. Ray of S. I. E. Society's College and Mr. Vyas, Principal of the New Era School, were the Chief Guests.



Vote India Campaign - Jaago Re!

The passion of the Council for youth empowerment was evident in its Vote India Campaign in association with Jaago Re! The Campaign's highlight was the presentation held for the students, which saw the attendance of the 'Jaago Re!' team and celebrity guests like Sushma Reddy on 4th February, 2009, who are associated with the cause. The response of the students was overwhelming and the Council directed them through the process of getting registered for their Voter-ID cards, besides addressing usual registration queries.

The College empowers its students, especially those who come to H.R. from outside Mumbai, by way of the Hostelites Association, started barely two years ago. The intention is to assist outstation students in finding their roots in a new environment. To make them feel literally

more at home, they are assigned to parents of local students who invite the hostelites for meals at home whenever they can.

The members of the Hostelites Association are also given an introductory tour around Mumbai, generally in the popular 'Mumbai Darshan' bus, to make them familiar with the different notable landmarks around Mumbai. The association has also set up counseling as an important activity.

The National Service Scheme (NSS) at H.R. consists of a Core Council for handling internal and external NSS matters. It has a logo-cum-motto: *Making a Difference*.

Annually, a book donation drive is conducted, getting students to donate books, which are then distributed amongst those who need them. In 2008, the University of Mumbai held a campaign against the against atomic bombings on Hiroshima and Nagasaki. The H.R. NSS group also took an oath and pledged to spread the message of peace and harmony.

A Seminar on First Aid was held at H.R. College in 2008, conducted by Dial 1298 Ambulance along with professional doctors. H.R.'s NSS volunteers attended the seminar and were trained in the proper procedure for providing First Aid.

Every year, the NSS unit at H.R. College hosts a series of socially relevant events like the Poster Making Competition, the Flag Selling, Debates, Seminars, Film Screenings and so on. In January 2009, the Red Ribbon Club was formed with the motive of spreading awareness about AIDS.

Anand Kendra is an orphanage situated at Worli, with 36 orphan children.

Volunteers of the HRNSS undertook a recent project to take the little ones out for a day. They were taken to Mani Bhavan, the Museum of Mahatma Gandhiji, and provided with refreshments during the visit.

In another initiative by Dr. Indu Shahani, Sheriff of Mumbai, along with Dial 1298 Ambulance and Indian Oil Corporation, a donation drive for victims affected by the floods in Bihar was undertaken in September 2008. The drive was carried out at ten places from South Mumbai to Chembur. The H.R. Sports Council also helped in the donation drive. Trucks were loaded every day with clothes, food packets and medicines and then transported to Bihar.

A 'Clean and Green College Campaign' is carried out by NSS volunteers who help the Vice-Principal (Administration) to maintain hygienic conditions in the College. The students give a daily report on the cleanliness of the corridors, classrooms and bathrooms.







Terrorism finds place in syllabus of HR College



BMS, BAF and BBI students will learn about its impact on businesses

Ways to cope with uncertainties like the recent terror attacks, its impact on businesses and first responder training, which equips one to deal with emergencies, are now a part of the syllabi of some programmes at HR College, Churchgate.

The 10-mark component, with the terror attacks as a case study, is part of the internal assessment and has been introduced in unaided programmes - Bachelor in Management Studies (BMS), Bachelor in Accounting and Finance (BAF) and Bachelor in Banking and Insurance (BBI).

"Under business environment in the second semester, we have introduced how businesses and individuals can cope with uncertainties in the environment and how the terror attacks have affected businesses. First responders workshop will be part of it," said Pratibha Pai, BMS coordinator at HR College. As part of field visits, BMS students will also be taken to the BMC's disaster management cell.

All students of the college will undergo training in first aid and basic life support techniques. Apart from this, Paul Barach, director of the Injury Risk Management and Research Centre at University of New South Wales (UNSW), Sydney, is scheduled to visit Mumbal next month to Introduce courses aimed at giving students skill sets to cope with the threats of terrorism and other disasters

"War is now on our streets. It's essential that we equip our youth to combat crisis. Hence. we're making first responders training mandatory for all," said Indu Shahani, principal of HR College and sheriff of Mumbai.

Students become Wi-Fi police

JUST 12 per cent of Mumbai's Wi-Fi users have secure, protected access, according to a survey of 6,700 wireless networks.

So Vijay Mukhi, chairman, IT Committee, Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FICCI) along with Indu Sahani, Sheriff of Mumbai and the Maharashtra police taught tudents to detect and secure insecure networks.

So far, Ruzbeh Raja (21), a law student, along with other college students surveyed networks at Churchgate, Nariman point, Colaba, Fort, Tardeo, D N Road and Worli. "Churchgate and Nariman Point were better secured than the rest. And commercial building connections were far more

Mukhi said that there are plans to equip the local police with Wi-fi network detectors. He said, "These Wi-Fi detectors are not available in Mumbai. They are available on the net for Rs 1,500 to 2.0000

week, four hours each. Terror mails sent from insecure Wi-Fi networks made me realise that I must help the city stay safe," said Farnaaz Kaladia (19), a BAF student, who also scans the city's insecure networks.

While Kaizad Marolia (19), a BCom student said, "Everyone can and should take the responsibility to secure networks instead of waiting for outsiders to do it. Router companies can give detailed instructions in manuals on how to do it."

"During our surveys of different areas, we saw that many people in authority did not know whether they had Wi-Fi networks, the importance of securing Wi-Fi networks or even what Wi-Fi is," added Kaladia.

"We conducted a survey along with the local police from Zone 1, 2 and 3. We are helping local police understand how to detect and secure networks. DCPs from various zones call us and tell us when they can accompany us to detect insecure networks. We secure these networks then and there and the police issues a notice warning them to secure their network or face punishment," said Raja.

Sanjay Mohite, DCP, enforcement said, "People should take securing their Wi-Fi networks seriously."

The College has partnered with FICCI and CII to

help develop entrepreneurship skills in students.

The College has tied up with the Bombay Chambers of Commerce (BCC) to involve its faculty and the students in developing strong industry-academia partnerships. The College has also partnered with the Federation of Indian Chambers of Commerce and Industry (FICCI) and the Confederation of Indian Industry (CII) to help develop entrepreneurship skills in students. The Hyderabad Sind National Collegiate (HSNC) Board, the governing body of H.R. College, has signed an MOU with the CII to promote academic excellence. Currently, Principal Dr. Indu Shahani is the Chairperson of the CII's sub-committee on Industry-Academia Interface.

H.R. has also tied up with National Entrepreneurship Network (NEN) and is the first affiliated college to have entered into this professional partnership to develop entrepreneurial skills in students by creating entrepreneurship clubs and E-cells. NEN has held several workshops and has invited iconic entrepreneurs to the College to interact with the staff and the students.

Another important alliance is with the Bombay Management Association (BMA), India's premier management association. H.R. College is a member of this eminent organization, and Dr. Indu Shahani is the Convenor of the Conceptual Forum at BMA. Leading names in industry such as J.P. Morgan Chase, KPMG and Ernst & Young come to the college campus and recruit students.

ICICI Bank has established the ICICI Learning Matrix at H.R. College. HSBC conducts Certificate Programmes on Corporate Social Responsibility. Thomas Cook India Ltd. holds workshops and is a regular recruiter on campus, as is Indian Hotels.

The College has developed strong links with the corporate sector. Students of the Advertising batch have been placed in agencies like Lowe, O&M and J. Walter Thompson. Taxation students have been placed in KPMG, CC Choksi & Co. and Arthur Anderson. H.R. has a tie-up with the Kuoni Academy of Travel for training its students enrolled in the Travel and Tourism course, and students have also been placed in TCI, Thomas Cook and Cox & Kings.



Market Based Solutions to Poverty in India

Mr. Nishant Lalwani is presently the senior consultant for the Monitor Group. He has conducted multisponsored market based studies and written articles on healthcare, energy and finance. He has worked with the UN and suggested high level changes for Swiss pharma firms. He has also worked extensively

with NGO's in India and in Africa. After getting a bachelors in engineering and a masters in aeronautical engineering, his interests turned to society and corporations.

In his lecture Mr. Lalwani said that attempts at eradicating poverty in India have at best been mediocre. Market-based solutions (MBS) rather than just aid or complete subsidization is the solution to this.

Mr. Lalwani then spoke about Gyan Shala-Ahmedabad which he feels is a great example of a market-based solution that has the potential to achieve scale. Gyan Shala is a project whereby the children living in the remote slums of Ahmedabad are educated. They focus more on the course material and how it is being taught rather than infrastructure, thus keeping the costs low.

After tackling the education aspect, the next important issue which Mr. Lalwani spoke of was that of water shortage. He further spoke about the 'Pay Per Use' system, examples of which are community water, filtration. The Gram Vikas Samithi operates these water plants on a day-to-day basis.



My Experiences

India and the U.K. have shared a past and can share a future too, as partners important to each others success. The system of the supply chain management works with precision & is built on the philosophy of simplicity requiring no information technology support. A tribute to this facility is that 99.99% of the time the dabba reaches the right place at the right time. The Government accorded the organization with a Six Sigma Certification.

Are the H.R. College international programmes focused on students alone? Far from it. In fact, all student initiatives are a fallout result of faculty development programmes, which percolate downward.

The first exposure to international travel came when the HSNC Board sent its Academic Committee to visit campuses in America. The Board was visionary, and realized the need to expose its academic faculty to international learning. A team of five persons had visited and come back with ideas that turned the

direction of education across all HSNC Board colleges.

The first International University delegation of 22 faculty and administrators from the University System of West Georgia came in the year 2000 for a 21 day exploration of India under the Study India Program. The vision was to understand the mindset of Indian students and their culture as the institutions had a large proportion of Indian students enrolled in their universities.

Mumbai: A growing number of Mumbai's educationists are bringing back fresh ideas from their trips abroad. The prescence of vibrant academic groups in research, innovative use of technology and plenty of teaching material are characteristics that set American institutions apart, say city Principals.

1962

Right from the start, H.R. College encouraged international exposure for its staff, as the following extract proves. Notes an editorial in the College magazine, Voyager, dated 1963: "Prof. (Ms.) N. B. Shroff has been the luckiest member of our staff, and deservingly so. In the middle of July 1962 she went 'Around the World in Sixty Days' on an 'Experiment in International Living'. Two of the highlights of her trip were her meeting with President John F. Kennedy and her appearance on American TV.

During her stay in the States she regularly kept us posted with not only her 'Discovery of America', but also, a Ia Robert Browning, her 'Home Thoughts from Abroad' through eminently readable ICBMs (Inter-Continental Ballistic Missives)!

She readily agreed to our request to piece together the more delectable parts of her epistles into a Voyager article for the perusal of her students. The latter will easily recall the tumultuous welcome they extended to her when she came back to the College on September 11 – to resume her interrupted Experiment in Indian Living!"

A few pages later, in the same issue of the 'Voyager', Prof (Ms.) N.B. Shroff writes a vivid essay titled 'My Experiment in International Living'. An excerpt: "The most memorable day happened to be the 5th of September, my 'Khordadsal' (birthday of Prophet Zarathushtra), when President Kennedy met us on the lawns of the White House. He was mobbed by us enthusiastic 'Experimenters', much to the discomfort and chagrin of his secret servicemen, but he did not seem to mind it. The Indian Ambassador held a very pleasant reception in our honour at the Indian Embassy, after which we left... Thus ended this unique 'Experiment', which promises to be the most memorable experience of my life, and which would not have materialised without the co-operation of the Principal and my colleagues of this College."

Susan Ambrose Provost, of the Centre of Excellence, Carnegie Mellon, conducted workshops for Principals, Vice Principals and Senior Faculty. An International Seminar on Indo-Australian Education followed. Faculty from the Board colleges were invited to attend.

Soon came a collaborative Educational Leadership Training Programme with the University of West Georgia in the 1990s. This programme was in two parts - Part I for three months in Mumbai and Part II for two weeks in West Georgia. Faculty members from West Georgia flew in to conduct the programme in Mumbai. Thereafter, 22 faculty members from the University System of Georgia came to participate in a Study India Programme for 21 days. The HSNC Board had paved the way for its institutions and given them direction in international exposure. Now, it was time for the each institution to forge ahead on its own.

H.R. College took the lead. Faculty Exchange Programmes with Georgia Perimeter College, Community County College, New Jersey Institute of Technology, Union College, and University of California at Berkeley resulted in teaching assignments, participation in conferences and Summer School. Faculty also visited the Center for the Study of Global Change, Indiana University Bloomington.

The need of the hour was exposure for all faculty members. Thus, for the first time, in 2005, 19 senior faculty members embarked on a journey to visit Carnegie Mellon, Columbia University and NYU Stern School of Business to attend academic workshops. Delegations of faculty members and administrative staff visited universities in U.K. in 2007 and Singapore in 2008.



During the visit the delegation met with heads and faculty of several schools and universities.



I am indeed delighted that H.R.College of Commerce & Economics is celebrating its Golden Jubilee this year.

As the senior most member of the Hyderabad (Sind) National Collegiate Board who has been associated with H.R. right from its inception, I deem it necessary to recall in some detail the history leading to the establishment of the College for the benefit of the young generation.

The Partition of India had uprooted a large section of the Sindhi Hindus from their homes. It was like an earthquake. Principal K. M. Kundnani who was serving as the Principal of the D. G. National College in Hyderabad (Sind) too found himself at the vortex of partition. He had to leave behind an educational institution so assiduously built by him. Principal Kundnani was a brilliant Professor of Physics and a qualified Director of Physical Education. On the strength of his qualification he could have easily got a cushy job for himself in Bombay. But he was deeply moved by the plight of his fellow teachers, nonteaching staff and students for whom starting a new life in Bombay all over again was very difficult. His first concern after coming to Bombay was to start an educational institution where the teachers and staff could be employed and students could continue their studies.

Within two years of coming to Bombay he established the first College at Bandra, the Rishi Dayaram National College. That was 1949. Barrister Hotchand Advani, a brilliant third generation lawyer, who was already a Member of the HSNC Board joined him. Barrister Advani became the President of the Hyderabad (Sind) National Collegiate Board while Principal Kundnani became its Secretary. Together they made a winning combination and went on to establish the K. C. College and K. C. Law College at Churchgate. H. R. College was the fourth major college in the series of Colleges established by the Board and the first dedicated to Commerce. Thereafter the Board created more than two dozen educational institutions in Mumbai and Ulhasnagar.

When I think of H.R. College, Principal H.C. Malkani is the first person who comes to my mind. Though I had not met him until I saw him as Principal of H.R. College. I call him a successful migrant Principal. He first joined Commerce College in Shikarpur and then moved to D.G. National College in Hyderabad, Sind as Principal of the Commerce College. Next he had to find a job in India. He got a job in Baroda college as Principal of the Commerce College and became a popular Principal. The Hyderabad (Sind) National Collegiate Board had created a Commerce college with a donation and now it is called H.R. College. He passed away on January 14,1971 and was 60

years old. During long years of his Principalship he worked very hard and H.R. College became very popular. The three Principals including Principal Gidwani, Principal Daryani and Principal Ajwani led the college and followed his example and worked hard to maintain and improve this great institution.

Today's Principal began her stint at H.R. College as a Vice Principal of the college from 1993 - 2001. During her Vice Principalship she started several international initiatives with foreign universities. As a Vice Principal, Principal Ajwani gave her all the liberties to develop the college in which ever way she wanted. She initiated many activities as Vice Principal like Faculty Exchanges with Australia and Monash University. The Board and the then President Mr. Ashok Advani encouraged her. The Board encouraged her. Two Professors from Harvard University came to Mumbai for a week to train the teachers. The Economic Convention was her idea, she made it international. Three Faculty Development Programmes took place in U.S.A, U.K, and Singapore. When she became Sheriff of Mumbai, she took the Principals of Mumbai University abroad. Finance was done by the corporates. She did not take any financial help from the Board.

Student empowerment and student development, Infrastructural changes are high on her agenda. She has brought an open access library. Now all the classrooms of the college are air conditioned. The College looks like a world class institute.

I will cite one important asset.

Admissions of new students are handled by the students very satisfactorily. The students take great pride in handling this important work. At the time of admissions parents are served with tea/coffee and there are no long queues of students and parents who wait for admission.

She has earned many awards in India as well as abroad. Citizen of Mumbai Award from the Rotary Club of South Mumbai was given to her. She has been conferred a D.Litt. from the University of Westminster, UK. She was the first Sindhi woman who has been appointed as Sheriff of Mumbai.

Today H.R. College is the most sought-after College of Commerce and Economics in Mumbai. It has become synonymous with Principal Dr. Indu Shahani. The reputation of the college has reached beyond the shores of Bombay right up to the gulf countries.

I congratulate the H.R. College on the joyous occasion of its Golden Jubilee and wish the institution glorious success. My best compliments to the Principal, teachers, staff and students of the College.
