If Pakistan is stable and prosperous, that's good for India," he said.

Obama was at his diplomatic best when he said Pakistan is an enormous country which is

strategically important not just for the US, but for the world. It has some extremist elements, but they are not unique to Pakistan, he added. "The Pakistan government is aware of it. We have been engaging aggressively with them to communicate that we want nothing more than a stable, prosperous and peaceful Pakistan," said Obama.




# GERMINATING AN INSTITUTIONAL OAK




It was the historic day of June 20, 1960 that saw the doors of Bombay's newest College of Commerce & Economics open wide at dawn. The city, back then, wasn't so populated, and the Principal wondered if he would have enough students to fill his classes.

History shows that classes filled up soon enough!

Located on 123 Dinshaw Wachha Road, at the intersection of the road that faces the University of Mumbai, with its imposing clock tower, the College was founded on idealism.

While the seed of what is today known as the Hassaram Rijhumal College of Commerce & Economics was planted in Hyderabad Sind (formerly undivided India), in 1945, and it was, perhaps, the first commerce college there, although another commerce college was also started in the same year in Karachi, the fledgling Institution had to be hastily forsaken in the storm of Partition.

Uprooted and felled as their spirit was, the foresighted and feisty founding fathers of the College were not about to give up easily, and certainly not in their mission to create an educational institution of lasting value once they migrated to Mumbai (then Bombay) and attempted to restart their lives again. The trials were tremendous, but so was the tenacity of the many mighty men who were determined to germinate this institutional oak again.

One such visionary was Principal Kundnani who, along with Barrister Hotchand Advani, reconstituted the Hyderabad Sind National Collegiate (HSNC) Board in Mumbai, and set about restarting the two colleges the Board already ran in Sind, pre-Partition.

One was the D.G. National College, which was the very first college founded by the HSNC Board in Sind in 1921, and of which Principal Kundnani was Principal at the time of Partition. The second was the College of Commerce & Economics, started with the financial support of the merchant Bhaiband community of Hyderabad.

An interesting, and not entirely coincidental, fact is that when it first started in 1945, H.C. Malkani was appointed as its Principal - and when the College restarted in Mumbai in 1960, the mantle yet again fell upon the industrious H.C. Malkani, to take on the 'principal' role in mentoring and remaking the destiny of an institution that was so closely linked to his own! It was almost as though the two, the College and Principal H.C. Malkani, were a match made with divine exactitude that not even the ruinous Partition could rent as under.

In the intervening years, between his two stints as Principal of the College, a lot had transpired. Most significantly, the map of the Sub Continent was irrevocably altered, and with it the lives of thousands of dispossessed Sindhis - all of who had to run helter-skelter overnight.



The building of the College of Commerce & Economics in Sind, which was inaugurated on October 13, 1945, by Dr. Radhakrishnan, the then Vice-Chancellor of the Banaras Hindu University was, according to the annals of history, occupied by Muslim refugees on September 12, 1947, leaving the Principal and staff with no option but to flee for their safety.


At the time, the College was already functioning as a reputed full-grade B.Com. College, affiliated to the University of Bombay, as all reputed colleges of Sind were in those days. All that came to naught, as the two Colleges set up by the HSNC Board had to be closed down in the aftermath of the Partition.

Fortunately, Principal Kundnani took it upon himself to revive them again in Mumbai. The first to get up and running was the Rishi Dayaram & Hassaram National College (of Arts and Science) in Bandra, built on a plot of land that Principal Kundnani obtained by the sweat of his blood and toil and, legend has it, by pawning his wife Jyotu's jewellery.

The challenges in getting that College started were stupendous, but Principal Kundnani was not found lacking in either vision or stamina, and far from feeling complacent over its successful commencement, he dreamt of building the HSNC Board, of which he was Secretary, into an educational colossus that would spawn many renowned colleges. In this, his mission was given wings by the late Barrister Hotchand Gopaldas Advani, an extraordinary visionary who was the Founder President of the HSNC Board.

So, in 1954 came the Kishinchand Chellaram (K.C.) College, in the heart of South Mumbai. Then followed, first, a Law College and, later, a Commerce College (subsequently christened the Hassaram Rijhumal College of Commerce & Economics, when a benevolent endowment of Rs. One lakh was given by the sons of Seth Hassaram Rijhumal). Both the Law and the Commerce Colleges were housed in a five-storied building adjoining the K.C. College at Churchgate, where they continue to be to this very day.

# Poster Created by Balasaheb Thackeray for the Student Symposium

Who would have imagined that one of the earliest contributors to the Voyager (the College magazine of H.R.) would be a cartoonist who later became, arguably, one of the most important men in Mumbai: Balasaheb Thackeray.

In the Acknowledgments of the Voyager, 1964, Editor J.N. Kamat writes: I am deeply indebted to Shri Bal Thackeray, the well-known cartoonist and Editor of Maarmik, for executing the poster that provoked a Student Symposium - 'Are You Indisciplined?'

Balasaheb, himself, may have no memory of his doodlings, but in the H.R. annals, his work is recorded for posterity.

As beginnings go, the renaissance of H.R. College in Mumbai (subsequently referred to simply as H.R.) couldn't have been more auspicious. Certainly, the God's needed to be exalted, as without some divine intervention the College that had been lost in Sind could not have been so swiftly and so splendidly restarted in Mumbai, and that too in such a short time.


An Akhand Path Bhog was performed for three days prior to the formal opening of the College. This entailed an incessant and ardent recitation of holy texts from the Granth Sahib. Daily, kirtans were performed by such legendary stalwarts of the time as Ram Panjwani, Tillibai Jiandani and Bhai Bhagwandas Masand. However, it must be underscored that the ethos of the College was secular from the start.

In fact, all the colleges of the Hyderabad Sind National Collegiate (HSNC) Board, prided themselves on their emphasis on the word 'National', and took due diligence in ensuring that education was accessible to all, irrespective of class, community or caste.

H.R. was no exception. Recorded in the Souvenir of the College, dated 1962, is the assertion that at its commencement "The majority of students were Gujarati, but other communities - the Deccanis, the Parsis, the Mahomedans and Christians also were represented in large numbers. The staff, too, was cosmopolitan; for, at the time of their appointment, only the qualifications were considered, as it should be. The College knew no barriers of community or creed."

The excitement was palpable when, on June 20, 1960, the H.R. College of Commerce & Economics was inaugurated in Bombay; the fourth college of the HSNC Board since its reconstitution after 1947.

In the brand new hall of the College sat an impressive audience including then Chief Justice H.K. Chainani (also Vice-President of

the HSNC Board), Principal T.M. Advani (ex Vice-Chancellor of the University of Bombay), Principal Kundnani, Principal Malkani and many prominent members of the community.

It was, from the very beginning, fully affiliated to the University of Bombay. And Principal Malkani was back in the saddle again, a powerful portent of the success that H.R. College would quickly see under his sagacious stewardship.

It is pertinent to point out that at the start of the twentieth century, there was not a single commerce college affiliated

to the University of Bombay. The very first one, Sydenham College of Commerce and Economics, commenced in 1913, and for several years thereafter it was the only one. Much later, two more commerce colleges were started. When H.R. appeared on the scene in 1960 it was, hence, among the very few commerce colleges in the city.

At the time when H.R. College was to be restarted, Principal Malkani (formerly Principal of the College in Sind), was the natural choice. But he wasn't in Mumbai, as in the tumultuous period post-

Partition, before H.R. was restarted, he had taken up a job as a Reader in Economics at the M.S. University of Baroda. He was invited, once again, to be the Principal of H.R., and he readily agreed to be at the head of a muchloved institution. The Souvenir of the College, dated 1962, states: "Whenever he looked back, he wondered whether it was the birth of a New College (which he presided over), or the rebirth of the old one! Whatever it was, the College grew from strength to strength, under his administration."

On the opening day of the College, an editorial in the Souvenir further recalls: "The two divisions in the First Year Commerce, for which the College was affiliated, were full, and the rush for admission was so great that the University had to give permission, as a special case, to have one more division. No doubt, the number of students seeking admission in the College was abnormally large; and yet the rousing reception to the College was a hearty sign that the College at Churchgate was satisfying a genuine need of the student community. Immediately, therefore, the Board decided to make it a full-grade College, and applied for affiliation; and considering the huge number of those who could not be admitted, it also sought permission for three divisions in the First Year Commerce class, and three divisions in the Inter Commerce Class. It is once more to be noted that not only were the divisions full, but that there was, as in the first year, a huge waiting list; and the University had, at the last minute, to give permission for a fourth division, with a total of 500 students, in all, in the First Year. The results of the students sent up for the first University Examination were satisfactory. The College established a reputation for itself in the very first year of its existence."

On the other hand, we should be ever conscious of what others have achieved and of what they have been achieving. While we seem to be groping and struggling, others seem to be running in the race of life. Yet, we must not feel discouraged, and say that 'the struggle not availeth'. Historical examples are there to show that progress does not take the same long time to reach the height painfully reached by the pioneers. The time lag is easily overcome, and those who have joined the race later show a spirit of freshness and even gain a lead. We are proud of our ancient cultural heritage and yet we must catch the new spirit of the age of science and industry.

Hence, the younger generation - the real leaders of the nation - should have a proper sense of reality, and also a spirit of optimism and rational enterprise, and produce, in a harmonious form, a synthesis of the antiquity of our culture and the modernity of the scientific age.

The College started on June 20, 1960 with Akhand Path Bhog by Founder Principal Prof. H.C. Malkani.










# NATIONAL ECONOMICS FESTIVAL

The Honours' Programme, a unique academic offering of H. R .College of Commerce & Economics, started from the academic year 2007-2008 and aims at enriching the regular curriculum prescribed by the University of Mumbai. It has proved to be a challenging programme for talented students whereby along with the undergraduate studies, a student can earn Honours' credits as well.

Committed to enriching the intellectual life of the students who participate in it, an opportunity is given to study intensively, independently and at an advanced level along with the regular undergraduate programme. This year the first Honours' batch graduated and the college organized Golden Honours' Day for the first time. As goodbyes were said to the graduating batch, 35 young and enthusiastic students were welcomed in the First Year who had gone through a rigorous screening process.

The SY Batch worked on an individualized research project carrying 10 credits to hone their analytical and research skills. They concluded this mega project over a period of 6 months. The project involved careful analysis of both primary and secondary data, as well as their own inferences and solutions. This year for the first time the students were introduced to a Peer Review wherein they had to write the critique of a project written by one of their peers. Students have enjoyed the stimulation of cross disciplinary research. It was all about learning in an enriched learning environment in small batches with other ambitious students.

The FY batch completed their 6 week NGO internship and had the opportunity to work with underprivileged children from the Dr. Balasaheb Ambedkar School. The internship was spread over the months of December and January. The students took up the challenge of training them for their Annual Sports Day and Dramatics Day.

They helped bring smiles to those innocent faces when the audience applauded them enthusiastically. Close interaction with the children enhanced the learning for the Honours'students.

with the theme "Restructuring of the Asian Economy". The topic was chosen keeping in mind the strong emergence of Asian economies in the New World Order. This was the first time that the convention had selected a topic from outside of India. 8 college teams participated in the convention this year. They were KC, CHM, PN Doshi, Jai Hind, RN Podar, RD National, MMK and H.R.

H.R. was given Indonesia as their focus of research for the EcoCon. The team decided to focus its research on Indonesia not just from a purely economic viewpoint but also highlighted the importance of human development as a key indicator of the growth and development. According to the format, the event is

The Research Cell is actively engaged in conducting research activities amongst the faculty and students.

The research initiatives by the faculty are very encouraging. The faculty is regularly sent to attend State and National level Seminars. The number of paper presentations and publications by the faculty has gone up significantly.

The college bagged its first Major Research award in Arts & Humanities awarded to Dr. Geeta Nair by the UGC, from 2011-2013. Dr. Nair has started guiding PhD students from the JJT University, Rajasthan from this year and is also a co-opted member of the Board of Studies in Business Economics of the University of Mumbai.

University of West Georgia is regarded as one of the best universities for undergraduate research and hosts Big Night, a celebration highlighting undergraduate research in the field of fine arts, business, education, humanities, the sciences and social sciences. Students work with faculty advisors on research projects for several months or longer and winners are chosen by an interdisciplinary panel of judges. The students of H.R. College, being ambassadors of India were invited to make a presentation by its President, Dr. Behruz Sethna. ### **PLACEMENT CELL**

The Placement Team under the leadership of its Director, Ms. Bindia Batheja, provides students with a platform to constantly stay in touch with the corporate world by means of live projects, summer internships and final placements.

Our alumni are based amongst the most respected organizations, nationally and internationally and are a significant source of support and encouragement.

#### **Placement Procedure**

Each year the placements begin with a specially organized 2-day workshop for all the students, instructing them on rules and guidelines to be followed during placements and giving them pointers on resume writing, group discussions, personal interviews and corporate etiquette in order to give them an edge.

**Pre-Placement Talk (PPT)**: The PPT provides an opportunity to the recruiting companies and the students to interact. Presentation by the companies about themselves (history, growth potential, future opportunity, etc.) and jobs available (content, compensation package, location, etc.) gives a very consequential insight to each aspiring student.

The college has assisted a large number of students to get placed in reputed organizations through the placement cell. The selected candidates this year were placed in several MNC's and renowned organizations. At H.R. College

The highlight of the trip was the presentations that the 8 teams of 5 students each prepared and presented on The Renewable Energy and its Impact on the Energy Sector, at the end of the two weeks of the program.

The program included a series of lectures by eminent faculty from NYU Stern School of Business. Prof. Srivatsan spoke on Globalization and Multi nationals, giving an insight on world trade. Prof. Joe Foudy and Prof. Bill Guth spoke on the Impact of Politics and Culture of Globalisation citing a lot of examples from the globalised world. There were many guest lecturers from the corporate sector too. Mr. Cecil Scheib, Director of Energy & Sustainability at NYU, threw light on the different applications of renewable

### **GLOBAL VIRTUAL EXCHANGE**





As the world gets "flatter" and outsourcing becomes pervasive, the need for students to interact with other students like them in other parts of the world is essential to understand the competitive nature of globalization. The aim is to give our students the experience of learning, communicating, understanding and negotiating with students from another culture... in short, preparing them for the "flat world."

New York University President, John Sexton, asserts that "new forms of university cooperation are within reach. On the micro level, it is easy to imagine a proliferation of team-taught courses that connect faculty between institutions, enriching the course experience for students and enhancing the possibilities for research collaboration."

Internationalization of Higher Education is the need of the hour. Advancement in information and communication technologies has begun to impact all aspects of contemporary education. Digital tools are being integrated with the teaching-learning environment to go beyond the confines of the classroom and engage with the global village of higher education.

In our efforts to take education beyond borders H.R. College of Commerce & Economics forged this partnership with NYU to foster intellectual capital, increase cross cultural understanding and enhance quality in higher education.

The Opportunity Programs at New York University and H.R. College of Commerce & Economics global virtual exchange has been one such collaboration where H.R. has moved beyond borders.

In February 2010, twelve business students from NYU volunteered to participate in the Global Virtual Exchange with twelve students from H.R. College in Mumbai, India. There were two online sessions in real time; February 8 and 15. Due to the time difference, NYU students logged into the Virtual Classroom at 10:00 p.m. while H.R. College students logged in at 8:30 a.m. in Mumbai. Both online discussions were productive as students discussed marketing concepts in culturally different societies. Between the two online sessions, students worked in groups on their assignments.

Students viewed 12 commercials, both American and Indian, on three selected themes: driving safely, global warming, and matrimonials. NYU students selected one mediocre American commercial and remade it for the Indian market and the H.R. students worked on a mediocre Indian commercial and

remade it for the USA market. Students had to ask each other questions about each other's culture to see what ideas and concepts worked or didn't work for the commercials in the two societies. Students were asked to write a script for the commercial based on a format that was provided. A professor from NYU-Stern and a business entrepreneur from Mumbai were asked to judge and select the group that came up with the best script for the remake of a commercial in terms of Relevance, Originality and Impact. All participants received a certificate of participation. The American students also received a copy of the Indian business magazine, "Business Today" (which was mailed to USA from H.R. College). Reciprocally, the Indian students received a copy of the American business magazine, "Business Week" (that NYU mailed them). The group that came up with the best idea for the commercial, three NYU and three H.R. students, received Malcolm Gladwell's The Tipping Point (Compliments of NYU Bookstore).

The global virtual exchange took place on the website developed by faculty in the Opportunity Programs at NYU and funded by New York State Education Department. The web address is http://www.global-elearning.com

The academic year 2010-11 began with SIFE HRC team winning the *Western Regional Competition 2010* organized by **SIFE India**, and ranking second in All-India with their Project Chirag at the SIFE National in July 2010.

For their commendable performance, the core group of SIFE HRC received a part scholarship to attend the **SIFE World Cup** as observers at Los Angeles in October 2010.

This brought about a great learning opportunity as the students watched all the amazing work presented by colleges from across the World, not to mention the fact that SIFE members returned highly motivated too!

### CHIRAG LIGHT INDIA MOVEMENT

College on the morning of January 13, 2011, the opening ceremony.

The opening ceremony, in itself, was a sight to behold. The several hundred



Institute of Management Studies explained the importance of implementation quotient over intelligence quotient and emotional quotient.



Sitting idle at home, she approached local Australian beauty parlours for a job. However, Gupta met with disappointment. Not a single beauty parlour recognised her Indian qualification as a beautician.

These case studies coupled with the size zero fetish that

Dr Rajeshwari Ravi observed among her students, triggered this commerce and management professor at HR College, to pursue a doctoral research on the flaws that exist in the fitness, beauty and wellness industry.

"I noticed that right from my students to my maid, everybody wants to look svelte. The beauty and fitness industry is a burgeoning one, but there is no regularisation. It's an unorganised industry," says Rajeshwari who spent two lakhs on the two-year long totally self-sponsored research. She also happens to be the first one to have touched on the subject highlighting the loopholes within this industry.

And the fruit of her thesis - A Study on the

Revolution in Beauty and Health Care in Mumbai - a 279 page compilation is soon to take shape of a book.

High-end shampoo brands being refilled with cheaper duplicate content for your pedicures and manicures, suppliers selling counterfeit beauty products off the shelves, the absence of a recognised institute training masseurs, beauticians and fitness trainers to ensure qualitative and risk-free services to customers, and no specified hygiene norms and spatial regulations; constitute core areas of the study. It wasn't easy to break ice with several beauticians before digging out inside information.

"I did countless pedicures before the staff spilled the beans," Rajeshwari says.

The most inherent defect, however, as pointed out in the study, is the fact that there is no seperate licenses required to run a beauty parlour. "They are all run using the same shops and establishment gumasta license. I could be running a kirana store one day, and if it flops I could simply open a beauty parlour in the same premises by only registering a change in business with the BMC," says the 50-year-old professor who spent two years interviewing 500 beauty and fitness customers and visiting 180 beauty salons and 150 fitness centers across the length and breadth of the city.

#### **WORKSHOP ON** MATHEMATICAL MODELING & **USE OF FREE MATH SOFTWARE**

Ms. Shubhada Amin and Ms. Vijayalaxmi Suvarna from the Dept. of Mathematics attended a workshop on Mathematical Modeling & Use of Free Math Software held at the Institute of Chemical Technology (ICT), Matunga on Feb. 26-27, 2011.

In the 1st session on Feb. 26, Dr. A. K. Sahu from ICT gave an introduction about mathematical modeling. He also conducted a practical session on the use of MS-Excel in solving problems on matrices and numerical methods. In the 2nd session, Dr. I.K. Rana from IIT-B explained mathematical modeling with various examples and exercises. He demonstrated 'GeoGebra', a free software which is very useful for solving geometrical problems.

On February 27, several mathematical softwares were shown. In session one, Dr. Katre from University of Pune demonstrated 'Scilab'. He showed methods used to solve linear algebraic problems with real as well as complex variables. In Session Two, Dr. Ajit Kumar from ICT demonstrated 'R' which is very good for handling data as well as solving statistical problems. In Session Three, Dr. Manjusha Joshi from Bhaskaracharya Pratishthan demonstrated use of 'Sage' which is useful for writing programs to solve mathematical problems and graphical representations.

It was an enlightening and insightful workshop as the software can be easily used to demonstrate graphs and statistical problems in the classroom.



Kshitij saw H.R. make records of sorts. For the statistically minded, it is prudent to note that in addition to winning the **Overall trophy**, H.R. also swept the







# Protect The Next Generation

Let's educate Indian women about how to combat cervical cancer

y career has been spent on the campuses of schools and colleges. Over four decades, the most heart-warming change I've noticed is the increase in the population of girls in Indian classrooms. Today's young women have better opportunities, greater academic accomplishment and, at least in our big cities and urban milieu, greater social autonomy than ever before.

In the past decade, as India's economy has grown and as the media and marketing revolutions have transformed our society, urban women are living a different lifestyle. As a teacher, I see this in schools and colleges every day. It is evident in the way young people eat, meet, interact, entertain and relax.

Some tend to be judgmental about these changes and see them as necessarily bad; I'm not so sure. Evolution is inevitable. We should welcome it and adapt to it, rather than rail against it. Unfortunately, not enough effort is being made in this direction.

Take public health, particularly the health of women. Lifestyle changes, the growth of a snack food culture, tobacco use, greater sexual freedom and career women postponing pregnancy decisions: all of these have profound health implications. Are we preparing our young women for these? As an educationist, I can never run away from this fundamental question.

Why am I focused on health implications for women? After all, new lifestyles and modes of living and working affect men equally, and surely have health consequences for them as well. True, but two caveats need to be entered here. First, there are some diseases – I refer specifically to two cancers, that of the

breast and that of the cervix – which are exclusive to women. Second, however much we may have closed the gender gap, the fact is that as a society we spend much less on the care and treatment of ill women than of men. Regrettably, this distinction is made in the mansions of

Malabar Hill as much as in the slums of Dharavi.

I've worked with breast cancer victims and awareness groups and much more is known about this disease today than even a decade ago. It's time to focus on cervical cancer prevention and treatment too. This is one of the rare cancers that is preventable and curable. Yet it afflicts 1,34,000 additional women in India each year (2008 figures). Some 2,75,000 women die of cervical cancer in the world every year. One of every four does so in India. One-third of women who register for cancer diagnosis in Indian hospitals suffer from cervical cancer.

The most common cause of cervical cancer is the human papillomavirus (HPV). The scientist who made that connection won the Nobel prize for medicine a few years ago. HPV is transmitted during sexual contact, particularly when the woman's immune system has been weakened by, for instance, smoking. Nevertheless, we hardly tell our young women about it. Puberty brings about a kaleidoscope of changes in a girl's persona – physical, physiological and psychological.

However much we may have closed the gender gap, the fact is that as a society we spend much less on the care and treatment of ill women than of men.

Puberty is therefore crucial to cervical cancer spread or, if we get it right, prevention. Experimenting with unprotected sex at this stage can enhance the risk of contracting HPV. A woman's cervix is underdeveloped at this age and has an immature epithelium (the top layer of tissue on the skin). This makes chances of infection higher.

Routine screening of the cervix through tests such as the pap smear is advisable for sexually active women of 30 years or older. It can offer early detection of cervical cancer. This test needs to be repeated every three years, as per protocol in most developed countries.

The remarkable aspect of modern

medical science is that we can arrest and combat the cancer (or more accurately, precancer) at several points. More recently, the HPV test is available to detect the presence of infection with high risk HPV types. Even if the HPV test is positive, it still does not mean the woman has cervical cancer; she just has an HPV infection.

Most HPV infections are temporary and the body's immune system subdues the infection in due course. Only if the virus persists will there be higher chances of the infection causing cervical cancer cell abnormalities and, later, cervical cancer. As such, layered, multiple and regular screening is essential. It can lead to timely detection and treatment, and prevent death due to cancer of the cervix.

Cervical cancer can also be prevented by using vaccines. Medical professionals recommend vaccinating with the HPV vaccine prior to a woman's first sexual encounter. A World Health Organisation position paper on HPV vaccination says: "HPV vaccines are most efficacious in females who are naive to vaccine-related HPV types. The primary target population is likely to be girls within the age of nine or 10 years through 13 years."

HPV vaccines are in use in over 100 countries. They are endorsed by the Federation of Obstetric and Gynecological Societies of India and the Indian Academy of Pediatrics. We should tell our daughters about them. Indeed, we should start a conversation about cervical cancer. The next generation needs to know, and needs to be protected.

# CHAMPIONS OF THE WORLD... NOW WHAT?

2nd April 2011. This date will go down in history as the day India brought home the World Cup after 28 years, and cemented its position as the best cricketing nation in the world.

But while some claim that India's win has made us a sporting super power, they calmly ignore the fact that besides cricket, Indians rarely get excited over achievements in any other sport.

The world's number one ranked doubles pair in tennis is Indian, as is the eighth (well half of it anyway). We have a world number three in women's badminton and have a number one Chess grandmaster as well. Indians have even been successful in golf, wrestling, athletics, archery, boxing, shooting, and recently, even motorsports.

However, a list of Indian sports achievements would be incomplete without a mention of Hockey, our national sport. India has won 8 Olympic gold medals and a World Cup, but sadly we have not been a force to reckon with since the mid eighties.

According to many, hockey and cricket were both equally popular in India till the eighties, with hockey enjoying a slight upper hand due to our numerous successes. However, in 1976 when hockey began to be played on Astroturf, the Indian team suddenly lost its edge and only managed a fifth place finish in the 1982 World Cup which was hosted in India. This combined with our winning the cricket World Cup in 1983 meant that cricket supplanted hockey as the new national pastime, and we haven't looked back since.

It's a matter of grave concern that while cricket is being given so much attention and cricketers are getting crores of rupees (and houses, and cars, and endorsements, and even FSI), other sportsmen get nearly nothing from the government unless they win something big (in which case they get a handshake from a minister, a garland of flowers and a cheque that comes several years late).

While earlier in this article I have mentioned that India has succeeded in various sports, I must add that these are exceptions rather than the rule. For a country of our size, our sporting achievements have been largely quite shameful, with some exceptions. China for example has won the most gold medals in both the Olympics and the Asian games, while the USA, Russia, and Germany have dominated the Olympics for decades.

Our performance at football, the most popular sport in the world, has been lackluster at best. We perpetually rank in the 140's and have qualified for the World Cup only once, and that too after all the other Asian teams withdrew!

To put things in perspective, India placed 50th at the 2008 Olympics. Mongolia won more medals than us, so did Azerbaijan, Slovenia, Estonia, Latvia and Bulgaria, countries whose entire combined population is less than the number of passengers travelling on the Mumbai suburban railway in a month!!

One then wonders why a country with more than one billion potential Olympians has produced so few. The fault for this lies mainly with the government and its all pervasive bureaucracy. The corruption and inefficiency of the various sports associations is an open secret, and most of their heads are usually despotic babus or politicians who have been rewarded for years of sycophancy towards their political masters. Forget experience, most have no connection to the sport whatsoever! Recently, in fact, sports association presidents were up in arms over a new regulation that would limit their terms as many of them have been treating these organizations as their personal fiefdoms for years now.

The blame must also be shared by us as well. We all watch the IPL and cheer for our favorite teams, but who watches the I League or the Premier Hockey League? People would rather watch Chelsea versus Manchester United than Mohan Bagan versus Dempo. The lack of

popular support is as much to blame as the lethargy of the government.

With the IPL and the Cricket World Cup garnering massive TRPs recently, it seems unlikely that other sports will step out of cricket's shadow anytime soon. Let me reiterate that cricket being popular is not at all a bad thing; it is the lack of support for other sports that is the problem. Perhaps the only option is to get the government out of sports, perhaps we need to commercialize other sports to gain fans, perhaps we just need to accept that no sport will ever outshine cricket.

Either way, let's just enjoy the game.

# **EMERGING MARKETS**

The youth (also known as 'GenNext') is one of the most powerful asset of a country especially a developing one like India. Often labelled as 'rebellious', this nature of people today can be advantageous especially because they are constantly pushing for radical changes particularly in political, economic and social fields. The population of our country is currently estimated to be about 1.21 billion, majority of which consists of people between 15 - 60 years of age. The high growth rate of population seems to have hampered economic growth as successive governments have been unable to control it. The Indian government has always endeavoured to bring down population growth to a level which it can handle. However, if this excessive labour is exploited correctly, the country can rise to great heights and emerge as a global superpower. As Rabindranath Tagore has rightly said, "Age considers; youth ventures."

It is often said that the youth is the future. That's why corporate sectors are now catering to the tastes of the youth. The upcoming changes in the technology sector include innovations in mobile phones catering to the masses. Almost every family in villages across the country owns a mobile phone. It is now cheaper than ever and more convenient to use than a landline phone. Handset manufacturers and service providers have launched innovative products and services to cater to the needs of consumers. Nokia has launched a software 'Ovi Life tools' which has different applications providing agriculture and education services with entertainment as a supplement to communities in rural areas.

Agriculture services provide farmers with agriculture tips, market prices and even weather details. Education services provide simple courses on learning English in the local language as well as examination tips for students and

entertainment services cover news updates, astrology, bollywood and cricket. Youth customers have multiple accounts with different service providers to call friends and family at cheaper rates. Owning multiple handsets is expensive and inconvenient. To solve this problem, handset manufacturers like Nokia, Micromax and Karbonn have introduced handsets with dual sim capability. Another revolutionary change is the Unique ID system that inculcates banking habits among people in the rural areas by providing them with banking services accessible through a mobile phone.

Retailization is the morphing of businesses with traditional retail practices to cater to the changing environment. Many businesses are now realizing the importance of consumer intimacy which ultimately leads to consumer loyalty. They are concentrating on strengthening relationships with the consumers rather than the possible marginal loss when manufacturing products that cater to the consumers' needs.

The Indian youth population is busier than ever before with a higher purchasing power and more disposable income, thus willing to pay more for 'convenient food'. The main impact of urbanisation was a greater demand for convenient products. With its vast population base, growing middle class and strong macro-economic environment, the Indian market has seen processed food emerge as the one of its fastest growing segments. Supermarkets and hypermarkets have benefited greatly from increasing sales of packaged and processed food, and continue to do so. The sales of ready meals saw an increase of 18 per cent, packaged food 21 per cent and instant noodles 24 per cent in 2008. The youth, nowadays, is more health-conscious and there is more awareness about health foods. The sales of organic foods and fortified processed foods have increased

considerably in the last few years.

- The food and grocery (F&G) market will continue to grow at a rate of 4.1 per cent in the next 5 years.
- Organised F&G will grow from US\$ 3 billion in 2008 to US\$ 19 billion by 2014 at a rate of 33 per cent.
- F&G retail is dominated by the unorganized sector, with 98 per cent of the market being local kirana stores.
- Packaged food is 4 per cent of the F&G market. RTE/ frozen food share is less than 1 per cent of the packaged food market at US\$ 64 million.
- 2,800 organised retail outlets catered to F&G in 2008. The bulk of these are supermarkets (87 per cent) followed by hypermarkets (13 per cent).
- Total organised F&G space was 20 million sq. ft. in 2009, of which 60 per cent were hypermarkets and 37 per cent supermarkets.
- Between 2004 and 2008, the number of outlets grew by 68 per cent, while space grew by 70 per cent.
- The share of organised retail is expected to grow from 5 per cent of total retail to 12 per cent by 2014 and will show a growth rate of over 25 per cent between 2008 and 2014.
- F&G forms the largest share (65 per cent) of retail consumption. The market was about US\$ 270 billion in 2008 and is expected to reach US\$ 345 billion by 2014.

These changes show future trends in emerging markets which are becoming increasingly youth-centered. The youth is a crucial part of the country's development. If this power is harnessed correctly, population explosion will no longer be a problem and India will occupy a prominent position on the global map.

# Students bring light to 1,000 villages in state

OUT OF DARKNESS Project Chirag by HR College students teach villagers to use solar energy

MUMBAI: More than 1,000 homes in 33 remote villages of Maharashtra will see the light, literally, before Diwali this year. This is thanks to Project Chirag, an initiative by students of SIFE. HR College. Project Chirag is a programme that has already brought electricity to 942 dark villages in the last eight months and will add 80 more on Sunday. A team of 30 students is set light up the houses of Pardipada, a village in Thane district, which has had no electricity till date.

President of the project, Jyotirmoy Chaterjee, said, "Our vision is to light up 5,000 houses in three years. We will be working on the Pan India level in the next two months and globally in the next year."

Being involved in social activities since long, these students wanted to do some work in rural areas as well. "A few of us visited the Ujjaini village and talked to villagers. We realised elec-

tricity could help solve a majority of their problems like child education, etc" Abhinav Mehra, an active member told HT.

The students are keen on education and will be also lighting up Pragati Pratishthan Deaf and Mute School in Jawhar Taluka on Sunday. They think

it can be a centre for adult literacy at night. The project provides solar lamp units that comprise a solar lantern, a battery, a tube light and two solar panels that capture sunlight and convert it into light. A unique feature of this unit is that paraplegic people assemble the equipment and earn money from it. Local villagers are also being trained to use and service these equipments for future.

They enjoy proactive support and participation from their college authorities. "Dr Indu Shahani, principal of HR College and the Sheriff of Mumbai, along with prof Pratibha Pai have been major pillars in our campaign. They even joined us at some villages, Jyotirmoy added.

The villagers praise these students for the light, education and money they now earn in the time saved looking for firewood,

# Lighting up a dark India



# A group of city students are spreading light in the neglected landscape of rural India

he jargons roll off easily - quality control, production management, logistics, need assessment etc. One would assume Jyotirmoy Chatterji, 23, and Abhinav Mehra, 21, are talking about a management

submission. But the HR college students are rattling off lessons they learnt working on a massive mislighting up rural areas.

For an idea that essentially evolved out of the typical youth angst to "do

something" the duo have come a long way, impacting 33 villages, 1017 hous es and 5716 people in the process.

The sheer energy and passion with which they talk about Project Chirag is infectious. The idea was germinated earlier this year by the HR chapter of SIFE (Students in Free Enterprise), an international organisation promoting social entrepreneurship. "Initially we worked on urban projects, but realised rural development was the key," says Jyotirmoy, SIFE HRC president and one of the brains behind the idea. "A village visit on the outskirts of Mumbai revealed shocking truths residents had to walk 35 kms to charge

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
